

On Sunday, January 27th Bishop Robert Driesen met with congregational councils at St. John's Lutheran Church in Lewistown.

The trends in the world today are reductions in the number of congregations that are able to support one pastor alone.

Only 20% of people today identify themselves as regular worshippers in the congregations.

One question the Bishop put before us is "What are the options we have to maintain healthy and viable ministries?"

Whatever the future holds the Bishop reminded us that it is the nature of the church, the Body of Christ, to be about the work of God.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Sunday, January 27th Bishop Robert Driesen met with congregational councils at St. John's Lutheran Church in Lewistown. His message was one about the changing face of the church and its impact on congregations and, particularly, the congregations of the Upper Susquehanna Synod.

The trends in the world today are reductions in the number of congregations that are able to support one pastor alone. It is a trend that we at Messiah can recognize as a potential reality and a challenge to overcome. What we may not realize is the breadth of this problem across the church. The number of congregations in the Upper Susquehanna has been reduced from 137 to 131.

Plus it is not a problem only for Lutherans but is a problem among Methodists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Baptists, and independents, as well. The only religious body experiencing growth in the US are Roman Catholics but that is because the majority of immigrants coming into our country are coming from predominantly Roman Catholic cultures. Countering the overall statistical growth, however, is that worship attendance is not up overall in US Roman Catholic congregations.

Only 20% of people today identify themselves as regular worshippers in the congregations. Plus that definition of regular worshipper has shifted from weekly to twice a month. The fastest growing group of individuals spiritually in our country today is "non affiliated." By 2050 it is projected that those self identifying as regular worshippers will be only 10% of the population. These statistics are a real indication for concern for the challenges of the future.

One question the Bishop put before us is "What are the options we have to maintain healthy and viable ministries?" The options are widely varied from more closing to merging as parishes to a pastor over seeing several congregations with Authorized Lay Worship Leaders helping to cover worship leadership to part-time pastors to bi-vocational pastors having a secular job to joining ministries with our ecumenical partners to attain financial viability. Whatever the solution in a given location what is clear is that the future is complex and the role of the pastor in ministry is going to be significantly changed. Lay people will need to be much more central to numerous types of ministries, especially, worship leadership and visitation.

Whatever the future holds the Bishop reminded us that it is the nature of the church, the Body of Christ, to be about the work of God. He, also, noted that we are a resurrection people and that belief in resurrection, also, means acknowledging that death is our constant companion in life and that the Body of Christ has experienced death in many forms in the past and has always continued to move forward I ministry proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ and caring for God's children. It indeed may look different in the future but we will still be God's people doing God's work.

Messiah Women of the ELCA met Thursday, January 10, 2013 at 7:00 p.m. in the Youth Area.

Claire Mummah had a very interesting program about "Back in Jesus' Day" (houses and living space) and also "To Thai With Love" about Lutheran World Relief quilts (70,000 are shipped there every year). The quilts are very beautiful, but they can be too thin to be warm enough. We

are reminded that the batting or middle layer in the quilts <u>really</u> matters. Warmth is important in all countries! Quilts are used until they are threadbare.

We are challenged to make 25 more quilts this year for the Mission Quilt Campaign. LWR hopes to collect 500,000 mission quilts by December 2013. Dark colors are preferred because they don't show the dirt! Lutherans can answer God's call to love and serve all those in need by making more QUILTS.

Personal Care Kits are our project for the beginning of 2013. Needed for the project are the following items:

- --dark colored bath towels approximately (52 x 27)
- --adult toothbrushes (can be large packages of more than 1)
- --sturdy combs with wide teeth

Please donate as many items as you are able. You can share God's grace and love by providing simple comfort, starting with a bath! Soap is always needed too! (any brand in original wrapping).

2013 LENTEN FISH DINNERS




