WORD

With the mountains and the foundations of the earth as the jury, God brings a lawsuit against Israel. God has "wearied" Israel by his long history of saving acts. God does not want or expect lavish sacrifices to attempt to earn divine favor. Rather God empowers his people to do justice, to love loyalty to God, and to walk shrewdly in God's service.

FIRST READING

A reading from Micah 6:1-8

THE LESSON READS:

Hear what the LORD says: Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. ²Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the LORD, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the LORD has a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel. ³"O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? Answer me! ⁴For I brought you up from the land of Egypt, and redeemed you from the house of slavery; and I sent before you Moses, Aaron, and Miriam. ⁵O my people, remember now what King Balak of Moab devised, what Balaam son of Beor answered him, and what happened from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the saving acts of the LORD." ⁶"With what shall I come before the LORD, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? ⁷Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" ⁸He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Lector: Here ends the reading. Cong: Thanks be to God. PSALM: Psalm 15 (responsively) L LORD, who may abide upon your holy hill? (Ps. 15:1)

¹LORD, who may dwell in your tabernacle? Who may abide upon your holy hill? **2Those who lead a blameless life and do what is right, who speak the truth from their heart**; ³they do not slander with the tongue, they do no evil to their friends; they do not cast discredit upon a neighbor.

⁴In their sight the wicked are rejected, but they honor those who fear the LORD. They have sworn upon their health and do not take back their word.

⁵They do not give their money in hope of gain, nor do they take bribes against the innocent. Those who do these things shall never be overthrown.

ALL LORD, who may abide upon your holy hill?

According to the world's standards of power and might, the message of the cross seems stupid and offensive. Yet this word reveals the paradoxical way God has chosen to work power and salvation through weakness, rejection, and suffering. Hence the message of the cross becomes true wisdom and power for believers.

SECOND READING

A reading from 1 Corinthians 1:18-31

THE LESSON READS:

¹⁸The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

²⁶Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. ²⁷But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; ²⁸God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, ²⁹so that no one might boast in the presence of God. ³⁰He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, ³¹in order that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."

> Lector: Here ends the reading. Cong: Thanks be to God.

FOLDING CHAIRS – Messiah members took most of the old folding chairs. The several that were left over were taken to the nursing home in Richfield. Thanks for helping to clear out a storage area and making the stored chairs useful again.

MESSIAH SIGNS – If you haven't noticed please check out the newly painted wooden Messiah signs on the outside of the west and north sides of the church. They were repainted by Jay Swartz at a cost of \$450.00. However, we received \$225.00 from a Messiah member toward the cost of that project, and it is greatly appreciated. Thanks to all who continue to support Messiah's many projects.

FUEL OIL USAGE – The following list indicates a rather large reduction in the amount of fuel oil we use each year, starting in October of 2008 when McClures were first hired to perform much-needed repairs on the furnace. Along with making the furnace much more efficient, we lowered the temperatures in our buildings. In the past year Fred Gross also worked many hours on the furnace to promote better efficiency. We still need to replace two broken steam traps which will be done soon. The Property Committee is so grateful for all the support from the congregation in our endeavor to significantly cut down on fuel oil expenses.

FOR UPCOMING VOTERS' ASSEMBLY – Several years ago when Men of Messiah decided to disband, the group gave the church treasurer about \$950 that was in their treasury. The treasurer put the funds into an interest bearing account in the event the group decided to be active at a later time. Recently it was mentioned to some of the former members that the funds were in this account and it was proposed that those funds be used towards the Stained Glass Fund debt. There will be an item in the Voters' Assembly to approve the transfer of these funds which now total \$1,027.46 to the Stained Glass Fund. If anyone has

NURSE'S NOTES – Love exercising outdoors, but hate the cold? How to dress for winter workout success:

- 1. Start by pulling on a fitted layer made of moisture-wicking wool or polypropylene not cotton or silk, which stay wet.
- 2. Add a heat-trapping middle layer when it's below 32 degrees. Fleece, made of wool or synthetics such as Polartec, keeps you toasty.
