

The problem is today that we are becoming a nation of Biblical illiterates and increasingly do not know simple basic Biblical concepts.

The Bible is a complex book but it is an understandable book and one that can be studied to very good ends. It is not some type of Dan Brown novel and jigsaw puzzle of deep dark mysteries. Every program of the church and every corner of our lives are benefitted when we directly and personally engage the Bible personally.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

If you are reading this newsletter then all the manipulations and calculations of Harold Camping to predict the beginning of the "rapture" as occurring on May 21st, 2011 have been proven wrong. Given the number of such predictions and the 100% failure rate over the 2000 years since Jesus Christ one would think that people, especially, the people of God, would begin to listen to what they read in scripture. ³⁶"No one knows when that day or hour will come. Even the angels in heaven and the Son don't know. Only the Father knows." (Matthew 24:36) It is straight forward and simple, no need for a lot of difficult translating or interpretation. People will give millions of dollars in fear of the unknown for some unbiblical prognosticator of the end of the world or the rapture while local congregations doing real work caring for their neighbors struggle.

The problem is today that we are becoming a nation of Biblical illiterates and increasingly do not know simple basic Biblical content and concepts. The excuses for either not reading the Bible, although 70 percent of Americans say they have read the Bible at least **once** during the past year, or more importantly studying it include; too busy, too difficult, too confusing, the world is too different today and a few others. Instead many people have chosen one of two other paths, 1) to forgo reading scripture at all on a regular basis let alone study it, or, 2) allow others to do the interpreting for them without using any criticism of what is being said, allowing people like Harold Camping and others to completely define for them what the Bible says because "He sounds smart" or seems to know a lot.

The Bible is a complex library of books but it is understandable and is one that can be studied to very good ends. It is not some type of Dan Brown novel and jigsaw puzzle of deep, dark mysteries. It is the experiences of people experiencing God's self revelation across centuries in real world contexts. It defines the basic doctrines of the church and points towards the basic values of lives well lived before God and dependent upon God. It provides the foundation for both Judaism and Christianity.

When individuals and congregations fail to study the Bible we give all the more power to those who either abandon its relevance and power all together or those who use it to their own ends as power to manipulate people. The middle path between these two positions is broad and deep but does require us to be involved and to pick up our Bibles and do some of the work for ourselves.

Every program of the church and every corner of our lives are benefitted when we directly and personally engage the Bible personally. When we do not participate in Sunday School classes and Bible studies, when we do not read the Bible devotionally at home, we empower those others who dismiss it or manipulate us through it.

When you come to a Bible study the Book of Faith initiative of the ELCA identifies four ways to read and study scripture; Devotionally, Historically, as a Lutheran Confessionally, and as Literature. Each is valid and important. Next month I will expand on these.

FYI (FOR YOUR INFORMATION)

WHY HEALTH KITS?

People must flee their homes quickly and often do not have time to pack essential items. Health kits can help refugees maintain personal hygiene while living in exile.

Items may also contribute to a new start for those who can return home. Lutheran World Relief distributes Health Kits and other aid to victims of natural and man made disasters around the world, such as the January 2010 earthquake in Haiti—25,645 Health Kits were distributed and August 2010 floods in Pakistan, 13,400 were distributed. The average number of kits distributed weekly by Lutheran World Relief in 2010 was 3,365 kits. In a year that totals 174,980.

At the present time, it costs \$2.65 to ship Health Kits overseas. At this rate, for a year it costs \$463,697.00. This takes a lot of individuals and congregations working together to remember "the least of Christ's brothers and sisters!"

(W)HOLY, (W)HOLY, (W)HOLY Health Healing & Wholeness Article June 2011

Who among us cannot identify with Paul when he laments, "I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do (Romans 7:19)? In the summertime, it is easy to just "go with the flow" when we picnic or vacation. It is at those times when we let down our guard that accidents happen. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, more than 3.7 million consumers have made unplanned trips to their hospitals' emergency departments...in just one summer!

We often hear safety tips and warnings in regard to swimming, biking, hiking, picnicking, etc., and it can be easy to tune them out, thinking, "Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. I've

heard this before! I'm careful!" So...I'd like to devote this month's article to safety issues you may not have heard before! For much more comprehensive listings, check out the websites of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the U.S. Consumer Safety Commission.

- --If the outside temperature is 85 degrees or higher, discard all food that has been sitting out for an hour. If the temperature is under 85 degrees, throw it away after 2 hours.
- --Never bring charcoal grills indoors [garage]. Burning charcoal produces deadly carbon monoxide.
- --If your plans include camping, and you want to heat the inside of your tent or popup, use only those portable heaters equipped with oxygen depletion sensors (ODS). Heaters also produce carbon monoxide (CO). One which is equipped with an ODS will automatically shut off if oxygen levels begin to fall in the enclosure. Certain camping lanterns can also cause CO poisoning.
- --Create three safety layers around your swimming pool – a fence, an alarm, and an eagle-eyed adult!
- --So-called "safe" fireworks, such as sparklers can reach temperatures above 1000 degrees, burning users and/or bystanders.
- --"Children who are not licensed to drive a car should not be allowed to operate off-road vehicles. [They] are particularly dangerous for children younger than 16 years who may have immature judgment and less developed motor (muscle)skills." (www.aap.org).
- --A cushion of at least 9" of wood chips should be distributed under playground equipment to serve as a shock absorber for falls.
- --The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends, "communities continue to develop skateboard parks, which are more likely to be monitored for safety than ramps and jumps constructed by kids at home."

Finally, I cringe whenever I drive by a home that has a trampoline in the yard! In fact AAP does not recommend the use of home trampolines. Children and adults are sustaining injuries, which range from sprains and strains to broken necks, head, and spinal cord injuries. Kids 15 and under account for two-thirds of all trampoline injuries, and almost 75% of all injuries involved more than one person being on the equipment at one time. According to the University of Michigan C. S. Mott Children's Hospital even adult supervision is not always adequate. Spotters need to be big enough and strong enough to protect the jumper if he/she gets too close to the edge. Though it can be a lot of fun, perhaps this is a piece of equipment better left to professional gymnasts.
