

One of the great challenges for any pastoral leader is how to open doors to important discussions within a congregation or denomination.

Pope Francis has been regularly calling the global body of the Roman Catholic Church to reflect on the nature and importance of what is and is not church doctrine; what is immutable and what is conditional and open to change.

This past week the Pennsylvania laws surrounding marriages were struck down as unconstitutional.

Denominationally, the ELCA has given congregations the right to determine for themselves how we will respond to such choices. This means we face important conversation. Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of the great challenges for any pastoral leader is how to open doors to important discussions within a congregation or denomination. We ELCA and most denominations have struggled to have difficult conversations about a variety of social challenges including how we relate to our Gay brothers and sisters and their calling a children of God into the life of the church.

Pope Francis has been regularly calling the global body of the Roman Catholic Church to reflect on the nature and importance of what is and is not church doctrine; what is immutable and what is conditional and open to transformation and change. This week while in flight with a group of reporters, Francis noted that while it is a gift to the church celibacy is not a dogma of the church. He was noting in saying this that celibacy is not necessary as a mark of the priesthood. In other words, he has opened a possibility of discussion involving this topic.

I cannot guess Francis's personal reasons for opening this discussion but Martin Luther felt that the demand of celibacy on the priesthood did not necessarily cause but led to sexual perversion within the ordained of the church. Luther saw the natural call to family as a God ordained order of creation and something that should not be denied members of clergy without a clear Biblical command to do so.

So how are we to deal with uncomfortable conversations? Conversations sometimes grounded in long years of practice when circumstances and new insights call us to reconsider our history and our future. We must simply hold those conversations faithfully, leaning on attitudes of grace and forgiveness before God. Sometimes following new paths leading us to places we have never gone before. And as Lutherans we strive for faithfulness to God's Word in Jesus Christ even as we see it expressed in new possibilities.

As we as ELCA Lutherans have wrestled with and debated numerous difficult issues surrounding human sexuality we have sometimes found ourselves frustrated, angered, fearful, and confused. At the same time in those same conversations some have found hope, grace and promise of resurrection life.

This past week the Pennsylvania laws surrounding marriages were struck down as unconstitutional making us the 19th state to find ourselves confronted by the possibility of Gay marriages in our communities. Denominationally, the ELCA has given congregations the right to determine for themselves how we will respond to such choices. That means that as a congregation we have the right to determine for ourselves how we proceed. To that end and because it is a decision for our congregational family please know that I have no intention of performing any such marriage rite at Messiah until we as a congregation decide together how we will move forward. While I find no compelling reason why we should not welcome and even bless our Gay brothers and sisters because I do believe in good order I will not presume to usurp the right of our congregation to make such a determination together. I state this for you because I want you to hear from me how I intend to conduct my role of leadership as your pastor. Knowing this you should not be tossed to and fro by rumors leading to distrust.

Messiah Women of ELCA met on May 8, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. The program for the evening was presented by Ann Beaver. She gave a very informative presentation on the Ana Baptists. Everyone present left the meeting with new knowledge on these groups.

The business meeting followed with the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports. Synodical Convention was discussed and applications were given to several members present. The Convention will be held at Camp Mount Luther on Saturday, August 2. See Barb Geedey if you are interested. The cost is \$40.00 to cover speakers, the use of Camp Mount Luther, morning refreshments and lunch. NOTE: We will be collecting small nail clippers (with or without files) to take to the Synod Convention. Target and K-Mart are two places that have them for a good price.

The group was informed that the remainder of the funds needed to cover the cost of a new Advent Banner will be provided by funds generated from the purchase of the Weis Club Cards.

Everyone remained after the meeting to take stock in what has been collected for the Baby Care Kits. To date we have collected 31 towels, 25 T-shirts, 53 pairs of diaper pins, 13 hooded shirts, 20 pairs of socks, 214 diapers, 29 long-sleeved gowns/pants/shirts, and 66 blankets. We will continue to collect these items as they are not sent until October. We will begin collecting for the School Kits in July when the sales begin.

Thank you to everyone who has helped with the various projects our group has collected over the years. Without the help of the congregation we would not be able to do half of what we accomplish.

The next WELCA meeting will be held on June 12, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. in the Youth Area. Cynthia Smith will present the program with refreshments by Claire Mummah and Ona Stoner. We are always looking for new members. All women are welcome!

Collection continues for Lutheran World Relief baby care kits. Items needed are:

- --2 (6-24 months) lightweight cotton T-shirts
- --2 long or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers

(without feet)

- --2 receiving blankets—medium weight cotton or flannel, crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn (up to 52" square)
- --4 cloth diapers (flat fold preferred)
- --1 jacket, sweater (with buttons or ties down front), or sweatshirt with a hood, or (include a baby cap)
- -- 2 pairs of socks
- --1 hand towel (dark color recommended)
 - --2 bath-size bars (4-5 oz.) of gentle soap in original wrapping
 - -- 2 diaper pins

WELCA Project for Friends of Pine Ridge Reservation for anyone who would like to help. Items needed are:

Toddler pants, teen p-j bottoms, sleepware for all ages, sun dresses and shorts, shirts and blouses, diaper bags, crib quilts, stuffed toys, bibs, cute colorful pillowcases, twin size bed sheets, crib sheets, Pack 'n Play size sheets, etc., sewn tote bags, knited or crocheted crib and smaller size baby blankets or afghans, slippers, cute scarves for the teens, mittens for the little ones, baby hats, booties, bunting, etc. Any colors, fibers and fabrics will work for any of the items that are made. The only restriction is (nothing with an owl print) as owls are a symbol of death in the Lakota culture.
