

together and are in the
midst of considering
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If we listen to the world it is easy to find numerous definitions of who we are and what our purpose is in life.

Turning to scripture, to the Word of God in Jesus Christ revealed in the Bible we can find God's vision for human life, for my life, for your life.

May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." Our purpose is to live in unity with Christ and to fulfill God's love in the world.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we travel our Lenten journey together and are in the midst of considering our calling as baptized Christians and our purpose in life we must allow scripture and the Word of God to address and define our lives. We are confronting the question, "What is it that God has created you for and called you to be?" "What is God's purpose for your life?"

If we listen to the world it is easy to find numerous definitions of who we are and what our purpose is in life. Defining ourselves by the modern American vision of success our purpose is to be successful in business, to gain economic independence, to have an ability to execute responsibilities and manage work for ourselves and others, and to avoid hearing those words at the end of every episode of The Apprentice, "You're fired."

Or we might define our purpose in terms of family and our family relationships; being a good spouse, a good parent, a good child, etc. Defining who we are and our purpose by our internal visions of what is right and good in each of those roles. In doing that fulfilling our purpose successfully can still be confused and distorted by measuring our success by our children's or our parents or whoever. And worse, our failure by our inability to protect absolutely all our loved ones from disease, tragedy, or struggle. And in placing our purpose and measure of success and failure in these things we again become contorted and distorted from God's vision and purpose for our lives and we struggle with pride and/or fear, sin and/or suffering.

Turning to scripture, to the Word of God in Jesus Christ revealed in the Bible we can find God's vision for human life, for my life, for your life. Doing that we find ourselves empowered to confidently pursue all of our relationships in proper balance. Family becomes a responsibility and a gift from God but it is not the purpose of life in itself. Work becomes a gift from God but it is not an end in itself and does not define us.

Turning to the Word of God we find ourselves defined by lives called to be lived in unity with Christ. Lives filled with his grace and purpose handed on to us. "John 17:19 For them I sanctify myself, that they too may be truly sanctified. 20 "My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, 21 that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. 22 I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: 23 I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." Our purpose is to live in unity with Christ and to fulfill God's love in the world.

Living in unity with Christ has a lot of implications for daily living; living in and among our family, living professionally in our workplace, living in the world but not of it. Allowing the Bible and the living Word of God in Jesus Christ to define our lives and our purpose restores relationships and labor to their proper places, gifts from God to be used and shared but things that cannot completely or ultimately define us. Rather we with God's grace and through God's Word define them.

As we move forward this Lent let us hear God's Word and may it define us and give us purpose so that we can live with confidence, courage, and conviction as Christians.


The meeting adjourned with the reading of "The Purpose" of the Women of the ELCA.

(W)HOLY, (W)HOLY, (W)HOLY Health Healing & Wholeness Article March 2011

"He was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray'..." (Luke 11:1)

If you have been raised in a faith tradition in which praying aloud by anyone other than the pastor or worship leader is not the norm, offering prayer and comfort to another via prayer (often called Prayers of Intercession), in his/her presence, can be very intimidating! However, bear in mind that there is no right or wrong way to pray - just many different approaches. Sometimes the old familiar prayers, such as the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, or the Jesus Prayer are most helpful. At other times just one word is sufficient: "Help!" "God." "Jesus!" "Savior." Paul reminds us that the Spirit helps us with sighs too deep for words." (Romans 8:26) Rev. Deborah Patterson, in her book, Healing Words for Healing People, reminds us: "Pray on your knees, on your back, on your feet. Pray as you wake, or before you go to sleep. Pray in thanksgiving before you eat, or for guidance before you begin your work." She goes on to say, "Can you breathe? Can you think? Can you talk? If you can do any of these things, you can pray."

Whether you are a parish nurse, a lay visitor, or just someone visiting a friend who is ill, there are many prayer resources that can assist you. Several of my favorites are, The Hospital Handbook: A Practical Guide to Hospital Visitation, by Lawrence Reimer and James Wagner, Healing Words for Healing People by Deborah Patterson, and Prayers for Help and Healing, by William Barclay. You may also come from a faith tradition which has its own bound Book of Prayer or Book of Common Prayer. These resources offer prayers that can be adapted to fit many different situations, or can be used during personal devotional time.

If you have favorite scripture passages,

or prayers that have been of comfort to you, consider copying them onto one side of a plain post card, and place your signature on the back - if you are comfortable with a computer, design them to be printed as needed. Think of them as you would greeting cards; they can provide you with the words that you've always wished you could find in the midst of a difficult situation. These handy cards can then be left with the person(s) with whom you are visiting, to serve as tangible reminders that someone is praying for, and with them. They can also serve as "calling cards" for the times you may visit someone in the hospital, only to find that he/she has been taken for testing or a procedure.

One example of a personal-favorite, hope-filled scripture, is Romans 8:37-39, "In all these things we have complete victory through Him who loved us! For I am certain that nothing can separate us from His love: neither death nor life, neither angels nor other heavenly rulers or powers, neither the present nor the future, neither the world above nor the world below – there is nothing in all creation that will ever be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord." Another is taken from 2 Corinthians 4:7-9, "We who have this scriptural treasure are like common clay pots, in order to show that the supreme power belongs to God, not to us. We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend, and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed."

Rev. Patterson ends the first chapter of <u>Healing Words...</u> with these profound statements, "God loves us whether we pray or not. Always. No matter what. And prayer [just] might help us to believe it. Amen!"
