When Martin Luther began the Reformation by nailing the 95 Theses to the door at the Wittenberg Castle church he was beginning what he conceived of as a conservative movement.

The results were anything but conservative and sparked a period dynamic change resulting from war, turmoil and chaos.

Luther understood that order was necessary in life and he saw that as the role of civil authority; to maintain order and suppress chaos so that people could hear the promise of the Gospel unfettered from fear and threat of destruction.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When Martin Luther began the Reformation by nailing the 95 Theses to the door at the Wittenberg Castle church he was beginning what he conceived of as a conservative movement. It was a call to the church to return to its roots in the Gospel of Jesus Christ and salvation by grace. The results were anything but conservative and sparked a period of dynamic change resulting from war, turmoil and chaos. The word of God, however, is always radical and transforming.

Times of chaos often result in tremendous periods of dynamic transition and progress. It is written in the opening verses of the book of Genesis that the "ruach," the spirit of God, moved over the face of the waters. This word "waters" can, also, be translated as "the deep," "the void," or "the chaos." If we understand the word as "chaos" then the creative force of God's Spirit calls creation and order out of this "chaos." The word of God changes everything.

Luther sought in the years following the start of the Reformation and in the resulting chaos of war, theological and physical, to bring order and direction to the chaos. He organized the German language and helped to establish a fixed grammar for it. He established economic principles for the function of the market and the community. He taught and established regular education for youth, including the creation of the Small Catechism for teaching theology, God talk, in the home. He prepared students to become pastors and put the Bible into the hands of the people in their own vernacular. Needless to say Luther was a busy man. But he understood that order was necessary in life and he saw that as the role of civil authority; to maintain order and suppress chaos so that people could hear the promise of the Gospel unfettered from fear and threat of destruction.

We are presently living in a country where chaos has once again been on the rise. Ever since 9/11 chaos has been present in our public and private consciousness in a way not known since WWII. This chaos can be used by some to promote fear. This chaos can be used by some as an excuse to diminish rights long secured to us as citizens of this great country by those who first drafted the Constitution and public order by which we direct ourselves as a nation. At the same time people can refuse to be accountable to any group or anyone except self leaving in their wake decay, confusion and, yes, more chaos.

What is from God does not lead to chaos except to bring judgment but always there is God's grace and hope. The disorder of the Garden of Eden leads to judgment and expulsion but with the blessing of clothing. Cain receives the mark of God as protection after God's judgment for the chaotic act of killing Abel. The flood of Noah gave way to new order and life with the promise of breeding pairs and a rainbow as a covenant sign of God's promise. The chaos of the wandering in the wilderness gave way to the people of Israel ordering their lives under the law of God.

God's will leads to order, not necessarily by force but **by God's will and our faithfulness**. As a last resort it uses the force of law to restrain those who persist in destruction and the neglect and harm of neighbor. It treats all people equally before the law, all fall short of the glory of God. In the present confusion and chaos that now surrounds us, we have the opportunity to speak and act on God's word of truth and reformation to the world.

Faithfulness to God means taking the risk to reach out and love one's neighbor in a hope of creating a new order in life instead of accepting the belief that enmity can never be changed into friendship and enemies can never become friends and partners. Chaos always gives way to the kingdom of God in our life and death.

"And though this world, with devils filled, Should threaten to undo us; We will not fear, for God hath willed His truth to triumph through us." *M.Luther*

"For the Lord will not reject forever. Although he causes grief, he will have compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love; for he does not willingly afflict or grieve anyone." (Lamentations 3:31-33, NRSV)

In August, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released a recommendation that all adults born between 1945 through 1965 (a.k.a. baby boomers) be tested for Hepatitis C. They termed it "a silent killer" and an "unrecognized health crisis," because this particular hepatitis virus can be present in the body, increasing the risk for transmission and causing serious liver damage, liver failure, cirrhosis, and liver cancer – all without one's knowledge. "It is the leading cause of liver transplants and liver cancer – the fastest-rising cause of all cancer-related deaths – in the US."

"Many baby boomers were infected with Hepatitis C during their teens and twenties. Some may have become infected via blood transfusions or other health care exposure before universal precautions and widespread blood testing were implemented in 1992. Others may have become infected from experimentation with drug use, even if only once decades ago. Because these exposures were often long ago, many baby boomers may not recall – or may be unwilling to discuss – the events that have placed them at risk. As a result, many have never been tested for hepatitis C." (... CDC Fact Sheet (August 2012). Hepatitis C: Expansion of Testing Recommendations, 2012. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: Atlanta, GA)

Health care exposures include: those on long-term dialysis treatment, accidental needlesticks involving blood from a patient with hepatitis C, recipients of blood, blood products, or transplanted tissue/organs from a donor who was an unknowing carrier. Less commonly, the virus can be spread via sexual contact, through sharing personal items such as razors and toothbrushes [containing blood contaminants], tattooing and/or piercings performed in unregulated settings, and from mother to baby during birth.

In its report, the CDC states it is making these testing recommendations for the following reasons:

- The vast majority (more than 75%) of American adults with hepatitis C are baby boomers. Testing people in this age group will help identify many undiagnosed cases.
- Deaths from hepatitis C are on the rise. As hepatitis C infected baby boomers age, the likelihood that they will develop serious, life-threatening complications from the disease increases unless those infections are appropriately diagnosed and treated.
- New therapies can cure up to 75% of persons treated for hepatitis C. Identifying silent cases of hepatitis infection has the potential to save more lives than ever before.

It is also important to re-iterate how the virus **is not spread**. It is not spread by sharing eating utensils, via breast feeding, hugging, kissing, holding hands, coughing, sneezing. It is also not spread through food or water, and has not been shown to be transmitted by mosquitoes or other insects.

Finally, because contracting this disease can be life-style related, there may be a temptation to 'blame the victim' for his/her choices leading to the disease. For those who do, I say, "Remember Job." Jobs friends sat with him, in silence, for days, but eventually, they gave in to the human habit of blaming the sufferer for his predicament. Their speeches were based on wrong assumptions. We all need to be careful what we assume to be true in the lives of others. Like Jobs friends, we cannot assume that suffering [with hepatitis C] is one's own fault, or is a result of youthful indiscretion and sins.

Speak to your doctor, and get tested. The process is simple and should be covered by most health insurance.
