One of the greatest challenges that we as Christians face is to define how we interact with the process of governing our democratic republic.

When we take scripture seriously in our lives it leads to real consequences and actions. Very often being a Christian is to walk faithfully where others fear to tread.

Those who walked the paths of the Civil Rights movement were most often people of faith, Jews and Christians among them along with others.

Let us allow the Spirit to lead us courageously forward in faith as the people of God have always done. Loving God and loving neighbor. Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of the greatest challenges that we as Christians face is to define how we interact with the process of governing our democratic republic. Some people attend churches that actively engage the political process handing out voting cards or pamphlets with ratings for candidates indicating who leadership or some organization thinks people should be voting for if one is a "good" Christian. Others think churches should have absolutely no connection to the realm of politics and should never utter the word or speak of anything political.

In contrast to these two approaches that seem to be all or nothing with regard to politics there is a third way. It is a path that has, historically, been part of the vibrant life of the body of Christ and which has led to many bold actions, for better or worse. That path assumes that the community of faith looks to the Bible to understand how faith and the community of faith engage the world. It is a place we tread fearfully with God.

When approaching issues in this manner one must be careful not to make assumptions of what one will find in the Word of God. If you have a preconceived belief there is little doubt that you can find a basis in scripture to justify it. The problem is that whenever one does that one tends to ignore anything inconvenient that may cut against your belief. It is not an honest process. Faithful people stood on both sides of the Civil War and both used biblical arguments to justify their position.

When we take scripture sincerely in our lives it leads to real consequences and actions. It shapes what we believe about our lives and our responsibilities to our neighbors. When we truly believe in loving God above everything and loving our neighbor as ourselves that shapes what we believe we are compelled to do. If it doesn't we must not fool ourselves into believing that God sees Christian living to be about maintaining our comfort levels. (Matthew 10:35ff) Very often being a Christian is to walk faithfully where others fear to tread. Those who walked the paths of the Civil Rights movement were most often people of faith, Jews and Christians among them along with others. Black and white, pastors and laity often walking arm in arm, defying law and being arrested, sometimes even dying for a belief all people should be equal under the law without regard to race and color.

When we fear having open and honest discussions about difficult issues and when we fail to act upon our faith because we might be uncomfortable or might make someone angry we can lose touch with how it always has been for the disciples of Christ; in the world but not of it. When we face difficult social questions like refugee children fleeing death and suffering at our border, when we consider what are the right and good uses if any of medical cannabis in bringing relief or treatment for children and adults with seizures, chronic pain, or cancer, or when we consider how we can welcome Hispanic, Gay, Islamic, or "other" persons into our love and concern as Christians let us start with our hearts and noses in the Bible. Then let us allow the Spirit to lead us courageously forward in faith as the people of God have always done, loving God and loving neighbor.

Ever since Jesus died on the cross for us, ever since the Apostles died for passing on the faith, ever since Paul walked throughout the Roman Empire, ever since you and I were baptized we have been set on a dangerous road comforted only by a faith we walk with God. We begin with God's Word and we move out into life remembering the cross before us.

We are now collecting items for the School Kits during July, August and September and are asking for help from the congregation. Items needed are:

--300 notebooks (with 70 sheets of paper per notebook), wide-or-college-ruled, 8 x

10 1/2 inches (no loose-leaf paper) (4 notebooks go with each kit)

- --75-30 centimeter rulers or rulers with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- --75 pencil sharpeners
- --75 blunt scissors

--375 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers

- --375 ballpoint pens (no gel ink)
- --75 boxes of 16-24 crayons
- --75 (21/2 inch) erasers

We already have the 75 bags that are needed to fill with the items listed above. Wal-Mart is presently selling notebooks for 25 cents a piece. Donated items may be placed on the round table in the Adult Sunday School Room.
