INTRODUCTION

Lent begins with a solemn call to fasting and repentance as we begin our journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. As we hear in today's readings, now is the acceptable time to return to the Lord. During Lent the people of God will reflect on the meaning of their baptism into Christ's death and resurrection. The sign of ashes suggests our human mortality and frailty. What seems like an ending is really an invitation to make each day a new beginning, in which we are washed in God's mercy and forgiveness. With the cross on our brow, we long for the spiritual renewal that flows from the springtime Easter feast to come.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

¹Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near—²a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come.

¹²Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; ¹³rend your hearts and not your clothing. EPISTLE LESSON: 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

^{6:1}As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday is one of the most sober days of our church year. It is sober because we set aside this day that starts the Lenten season to reflect on the quality of our lives. And when we do, we reach three conclusions: we are sinners, we are mortal, and we need our relationship with God renewed. And all three truths lead to the cross of Christ.

Ashes are symbolic of all three of these truths. Sinfulness: from Old Testament times, ashes have been used to show our guilt before God, as when someone donned sackcloth and ashes as an outward sign of contrition. Mortality: ashes are the remains of something once alive: we recognize this in our Christian burial service with the words "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust." Renewal: ashes also symbolize cleansing (soap was often made from ashes) and new life (fields are burned after the harvest to clear the ground and fertilize the soil for the new season's growth).

Therefore, since as early as the third century, Christians have used ashes as the symbol for this day which was set aside especially to recognize our great need for a savior, someone to save us from our guilt of sin and from our mortality and to renew us with the Father in heaven.

Those who wish will be able to follow this centuries-old Christian tradition of receiving ashes in the sign of the cross on their foreheads during our service this evening.
