

PONDERINGS OF THE PASTOR

Dear Messiah Family,

Practically the whole of the month of May is devoted to the liturgical season of Easter. What are some of your favorite hymns that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus? Perhaps among them are ones such as "Now the Green Blade Rises", "The Strife Is O'er, the Battle Done" or "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today; Alleluia!" I invite you to listen to hymns of Easter on a CD or the internet, perhaps through YouTube. Another way to experience these hymns is by reading them in a hymnal – read the lyrics and listen with your heart to the meaning. If you need to borrow a hymnal, contact the church office; we'll get one to you.

On Thursday May 18, we celebrate the Ascension of our Lord. Take a moment and read Luke 24:44-53 one more time. Note there is more to the Ascension than Jesus simply being lifted into Heaven. Look at verse 47 and imagine Jesus saying this not to his disciples, but **directly to you**. How does that image make you feel?

Pray now: Almighty God, your only Son was taken into the heavens and in your presence intercedes for us. Receive us and our prayers for the entire world, and in the end bring everything into your glory, through Jesus Christ, our Sovereign and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

As Jesus said: "Go and make disciples of all nations, says the Lord; I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Each Tuesday, a number of us join to share a time of Bible study and reflection on the Gospel message from the previous Sunday. The subjects are for May 2, "You are an instrument of acceptance" for May 9, "You are an instrument of courage", for May 16 "You are an instrument of change", for May 23 "You are an instrument of wisdom" and for May 30 "You are an instrument of the Holy Spirit."

May the blessings of God the Creator, Jesus Christ our Lord, and The Holy Spirit be with you all!

MUSIC SUNDAY – SUNDAY, MAY 14TH

As we celebrate the music of our church during the worship service on Mother's Day, Sunday, May 14th, here are some interesting facts about why we commemorate music in our church, courtesy of www.elca.org.

WHAT IS CHURCH MUSIC SUNDAY?

For centuries, the Introit for the Fourth Sunday of Easter was from Psalm 98, "Sing to the Lord a new song" ("Cantate Domino"). This day was often known as "Cantate Sunday" and, in some traditions, became a day to celebrate music in the church. The Introit no longer exists in today's Lutheran worship. However, in current lectionaries, Psalm 98 is appointed to be sung between the first and second reading on the Sixth Sunday of Easter during Year B. For that reason, since the publication of Lutheran Book of Worship in 1978, that Sunday has often been known as "Church Music Sunday."

Since this Sunday often falls near the end of the choir season, some congregations use this opportunity to publicly thank all who make music in their congregation. This usually takes the form of festive music and specific prayers. A luncheon or party may follow the liturgy.

Although the connection to a particular Sunday in the church year is no longer strong, the idea of publicly recognizing ministries in the church is an excellent idea. This can be done on any appropriate Sunday or festival as long as it does not detract from the central focus of the day.

DID MARTIN LUTHER REALLY USE TAVERN TUNES IN CHURCH?

It has been claimed by many people over the years that Martin Luther boldly seized songs commonly sung in taverns, changed the lyrics and then made them the basis of congregational song. In the interest of historical accuracy, in fairness to the reformer, and for the purpose of conversation about worship music today, this claim must be challenged, or at least be carefully qualified. At its worst this claim is a misrepresentation of fact. At its best, it is a misleading oversimplification of Luther's intention and his practice of liturgical music.

Comparing the music situation of Luther's time with our own is like comparing apples with oranges. At the time of Luther, there were no sharp distinctions between secular and sacred musical styles. When we speak today of "popular music," we mean it in a way not familiar to sixteenth-century Germany. (For more on German hymnody, see Hymnal Companion to the Lutheran Book of Worship in Resources)

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF MUSIC IN THE LUTHERAN LITURGY?

Music, especially singing, has been inextricably linked to our story as God's people. All God's people have sung throughout recorded history. The Israelites sang after their deliverance from Egypt. David sang in time of trouble and rejoicing. Mary and Simeon sang songs of thanksgiving. John, on the island of Patmos, heard the glorious songs of the angels in his vision. The psalms, the Bible's hymnbook, testify to the link of story to song: "Your love, O Lord, forever will I sing; from age to age my mouth will proclaim your faithfulness." (Psalm 89:1).

While Scripture and Christian history attest to the gifts of instruments and dancing, the human voice has been given central place in the Church's music. *Principles for Worship*, an ELCA document on worship, guides the church in its use of music in the assembly and will be the basis for much of what follows here. Of the human voice, it states: "In the church, the primary musical instrument is the human voice, given by God to sing and proclaim the word of God". Consideration for the role of music in worship takes as its starting point the singing of the whole congregation.

MUSIC AS GIFT

The question about music's role can

portray music exclusively as a kind of tool, suggesting that music exists only for the sake of something else. That is why the first role of music is not really a "role" at all. Luther regarded music first and foremost as gift, one of the principles of music listed in *Principles for Worship*: "God creates music as part of the whole creation and gives it to humankind to develop and shape." We receive music as a gift of God.

What is music's role in the service of God's people, the liturgy? These key roles are listed below partnered with a principle from *Principles for Worship* or *The Use of the Means of Grace*.

Building community

Music is a communal and relational activity. The assembly is the primary musical ensemble, and its song is the core of all music in.

"Build us up, Lord...form and shape your new creation" (ELW #670). When the church sings together, it remembers its common story and this story binds the baptized together as one people. When much of our society focuses on individual values and concerns, the church makes the claim that we are a community in Christ. Music shapes this community over time.

Such community is best served by music that encourages participation and uplifts the congregation's voice. An application of the above principle states:

"Regardless of musical style or instrumentation, leadership confidently supports and enables the voice of the congregation. Likewise, the voice of a soloist, cantor, assisting minister, or presiding minister is most effective when it does not overwhelm or dominate the congregation's voice."

The church benefits from many people using their diverse musical talents in service of the assembly's common song.

Forming and Expressing Christian Identity The assembly's song contributes to the spiritual formation of the assembly itself and its individual

members. Used carefully over time, the song forms communal and individual memory and serves to nurture the faith from one generation to another.

We often use the phrase "you are what you eat." We also are what we sing. For this reason, it is best to make careful choices about the tunes and texts an assembly will sing.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE CHOIR IN WORSHIP?

Put simply, a choir's role is to lead the assembly's song. This sounds simple enough, but what does this look and sound like?

Cantor and Choir -- The tradition of a choir leading worship is an ancient one that has been renewed and reformed over the centuries. The Old Testament refers to choirs of men and boys. Choirs in the early Christian church were modeled on choirs that led synagogue worship. With the advent of more complex, multi-layered music, choirs began to dominate worship music, leaving the assembly to simply listen. Martin Luther valued the choir but encouraged such groups to lead the assembly's song rather than dominate it. Even today, choirs and other singing ensembles need to be aware of their presence in worship, being careful to lead rather than usurping the assembly's singing.

Who sings in a choir? -- Men and women, young and old, professional musicians and amateurs who love to sing all can find a place in the choir. Some congregations have one choir for all ages; others have a graded choir program for children and one or more singing groups for adults. In some congregations, paid professional singers serve as section leaders and volunteers comprise the remainder of the choir, while in most other congregations, all members volunteer their time.

"But I can't sing." Many people will say they cannot sing, but in most cases, this is not true. Many may not know how to read music, but still enjoy singing. Some choir directors welcome those who learn by ear rather than reading music notation. In the rare situation that a person is tone-deaf or for some other reason cannot contribute to the choir in a beneficial way, the leader will want to steer that person into other areas of worship leadership.

HOW DO I BUILD A BUDGET?

REGISTRATION: Registration fees support the Gathering's programmatic, logistical and administrative operations. A \$150 deposit is required at the time of registration. A deposit is not required for MYLE or the Table. A limited amounted of money is set aside for assistance with registration fees.

Frequently Asked Questions

- ❖ I have never led a group and don't know where to start? We have lots of resources and experience and will walk you through every step of the process! We can provide power-points, handouts, fundraising ideas etc. The Gathering Website is a wonderful place to begin. The Gathering staff will also have on-line trainings for all leaders.
- We are not a wealthy congregation so how can we fund a Gathering? We understand and are happy to sit down with you and chat about your context and brainstorm ways to fund your trip. Maybe other churches in the area that have no current youth would be happy to help your youth. I cannot emphasize enough how important it is to start early. Both for fundraising and to build momentum.
- We have 3 or less youth and no adult chaperone, what do we do? Most of the conferences in the synod work together so I would suggest joining with another church from your conference would be a great way for the youth from your church to go.
- ❖ What is the Young Adult Gathering? Due to the cancellation of the 2022 Youth Gathering, many young people were not able to participate in these life-changing faith formation events. We are excited they are hosting the first-ever ELCA Young Adults gathering. This Gathering for young people who will be 18-35 at the time of the Gathering. We recognize that 18-35 is a wide age range and anticipate that most of our programming will be geared to 18-25 year olds. Programming and content are still being discerned. We do know that they will gather with the Youth Gathering each night for the Mass Gatherings. The Young Adult Gathering participants can NOT double at chaperones for the high school youth attending the Youth Gathering.
