THE PASTORS PONDERINGS

Dear Messiah Family,

Please read the following verses:

7"And to the angel of the church in Philadelphia write: These are the words of the holy one, the true one, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens: 8"I know your works. Look, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut. I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name."

And this verse:

¹After this I looked, and there in heaven a door stood open! And the first voice, which I had heard speaking to me like a trumpet, said, "Come up here,"

One common denominator of these passages is the "open door" found within this scripture. The door is open, and no one will shut this door. We see in the first selection that these are the words of the holy one, the genuine (true) one who has the authority (key) of David, and who opens the door. Who is the holy one? None other than Jesus, the Son of God is the one speaking to us.

The door is the door of Heaven, open to all believers. Jesus tells us that he is the way, the truth, and the life. Therefore, Jesus also is the door, the door which is always open, open to all who believe.

The first passage is from Revelation, chapter 3, and the second line is the first verse of chapter 4. The Boof of Revelation reveals so much of the Gospel, the Good News of God's salvation, grace, and love. When we break through the imagery depicted throughout these scriptures, we see once more God's nature in the gift of Jesus the lamb who was "slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation." (Revelation 5:9)

Let us pray:

God of glory, you have chosen to walk in our midst. For that we give you our thanks. God of might, you embrace weakness in order to make your love known to us. For that we give you our thanks. God of majesty, you are present with us whether our lives Are full of joy or over washed with pain. For all these things we give you our worship and praise. Amen.

In the Christian tradition, colors are used for vestments and paraments, but a unified system of colors developed only gradually and haphazardly until and through the Middle Ages. Today, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America provides a system of colors for use by its congregations; for the most part, the same system is also used by Roman and Anglican churches, at least in the United States; and by many churches around the world, including the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada.

Many of the colors associated with the seasons are closely linked with the experience of Christians in the Northern hemisphere. Christians in the Southern hemisphere will experience the church year differently in that context, perhaps calling forth different color associations. It is also helpful to realize that colors have different associations across the globe, just as they have had different associations over the course of the church's history. For example, white is the color North American and European Christians typically associate with Christmas and Easter, the color white signifying the purity of Christ, light or joy. In many Eastern cultures, however, white connotes mourning. Red, associated with energy, blood or fire among other things in Western culture, is the color associated with purity in India.

The colors serve to adorn the worship space, and to call attention to the nature of the season or festival being celebrated. A brief summary of their usage follows....

- BLUE is associated with Advent, suggesting hope. This association originated in Scandinavia, probably because purple dye was too expensive for churches to use. Some assemblies use purple in Advent, a color associated with royalty as the church awaits the newborn king.
- WHITE or GOLD, is used on Christmas Eve through Baptism of our Lord, calling to mind the purity of the newborn Christ, and to our light and joy in him. On Easter Sunday, the gold color symbolizes that this day is the "queen of feasts," unique in the entire church year and celebrates the joy of the resurrection. Also used on Holy Trinity Sunday, the color of white or gold expresses the joy of mystery in the Triune God. Finally, on Christ the King Sunday, the final day of the church year, white or gold is used as a festive color suggesting light, joy, and the celebration of our Lord.
- **GREEN** is used for its symbolism of our growth in Christ during the Epiphany season. Green, in a sense, is a "neutral color." During the season of Pentecost, green is used to indicate our growth in faith as we follow the teachings and ministry of Christ. Some churches use differing shades of green throughout the Sundays after Pentecost, a lighter green in summer and a darker green in fall.
- **PURPLE** is the preferred color on Ash Wednesday, as this is the first day of Lent. Historically, black has also been used on this day, since it is the color of the ashes to which we will all return. Purple is also typically associated with the entire season of Lent, suggesting repentance and solemnity.
- **SCARLET or RED** is the preferred color of this first day of Holy Week, as it suggests the deep color of blood. Red, as the color of fire, is also used on Pentecost day, when we remember the tongues of fire descended on the crowd in Jerusalem.

STATEMENT FROM ELCA BISHOP EATON



"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?"—Psalm 22:1

Dear church.

As Lutherans, we are accustomed to holding tension between two truths. Thus the ELCA denounces the egregious acts of Hamas, acts that have led to unspeakable loss of life and hope. At the same time the ELCA denounces the indiscriminate retaliation of Israel against the Palestinian people, both Christian and Muslim.

For the past weeks we have borne witness to the horrors of the escalating crisis between Israel and Hamas. We also watch a growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza as Israel blocks food, water, fuel and medical supplies and as airstrikes continue to cause unbearable civilian casualties ahead of a justannounced ground assault. We see Israelis and families around the world in the agonizing wait for word about the fate of loved ones killed or taken hostage by Hamas. We are in anguish, grieving and praying for all people who are living in trauma, fear and uncertainty.

Among us are Palestinian Lutherans who are fearful for their families, their communities and their homeland. In our communities we have Jewish and Muslim neighbors, who are also facing the horrors of this crisis and its impact on their loved ones.

It is difficult to find words that suffice in the complexity of this moment, and in the web of relationships that bind us together, as church, with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and our interreligious partners. Yet God has called us to be a people who stand with others amid suffering.

We must also call a thing a thing. The power exerted against all Palestinian people — through the occupation, the expansion of settlements and the escalating violence — must be called out as a root cause of what we are witnessing. We are committed to our long-standing accompaniment of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

The God who liberates us calls us to be a liberating witness. May it be so.


