

JUNIATA COUNTY FOOD PANTRY OCTOBER UPDATE



Autumn has arrived! Soon to be followed by Thanksgiving and Christmas. Again, this year the Food Pantry will join forces with the Boy Scouts, Kiwanis, and YOU to bring Thanksgiving and Christmas meals to as many Juniata County families living in poverty as possible. Working as a team and pooling our resources, we can reach more families in need and avoid duplicating services. But we can't do it without your help. When the Boy Scouts come to your door in November for their annual food drive- please give generously. And if you can help us to start stockpiling the following foods for the holidays, we would really appreciate it. Our goal is to provide 800 meals: 400 for Thanksgiving and 400 for Christmas. Weare also collecting kids' winter attire for Christmas gifts: hats, coats, mittens, and scarves.

In August 2025, the Food Pantry served 291 families in need – a total of 747 individuals. Thank you to Heaven Bound Church for sending volunteers to help in August!!


MISSION OF THE MONTH

Incentive: This year, each individual who turns in at least \$125.00 in donations will receive a CROP Walk T-Shirt. Please write your T-Shirt size on your donation envelope. If your shirt size is not available on the day of the Walk, it will be ordered and delivered to your church or team chair after the Walk.

Everyone: When you arrive, please give your collection envelope to a registrar. If you are walking with a team, please make sure your team name (like your church) is on your envelope. If more than one person is sharing your collection envelope, please make sure each person's signature (or guardian's signature) is on the envelope.

Walkers can deliver the following needed items to the Food Pantry on CROP Walk day:

<u>Personal Hygiene Supplies</u> such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, deodorant, shaving cream, razors, etc.

<u>Cleaning Supplies</u> like all-purpose cleansers, bleach, trash bags, laundry detergent, dish detergent, etc. <u>Paper Products</u> such as paper towels, toilet tissue, tissues.

Infant Needs like diapers, baby wipes, baby shampoo, baby lotions.

Non-Perishable Food Items.

Proceeds will benefit Hunger Ministries through CWS, and 25% of pledge money will go to Meals-On-Wheels and the Food Pantry. Checks may be made payable to CWS/CROP. Donation envelopes and brochures are available on the table in the Adult Sunday School Room.



At this point, initial interest has already created a solid *core group* of approximately forty volunteer singers and I would welcome additional voices.

This year's chosen Community Christmas Cantata is **THE WINTER ROSE** by Joseph M. Martin. While the public performance will be free of an admission charge, a freewill offering will be collected to benefit our local Juniata County Food Pantry.

REHEARSAL DATES & LOCATIONS: Beginning on Monday, October 20th, the weekly rehearsals will alternate between Monday & Tuesday evenings with the first four rehearsals (Oct. 20 & 28, Nov. 3 & 11) being held at Port Royal Lutheran Church (402 Market St, Port Royal PA 17082) and the final four practices (Nov. 17 & 25, Dec. 1 & 9) being held at the Free Spring Church. *All rehearsals will run from 7:00 to 8:30 PM.* I trust that participants will find the practices to be both fun and structured in a way that helps build confidence in singing their chosen vocal parts.



ENDING AT THE BEGINNING

I started my ministry as presiding bishop with these four emphases: We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. We are church for the sake of the world. I will end as I began.

We are church. There is no other institution on earth whose reason for being is the proclamation of the gospel. "It is also taught that at all times there must be and remain one holy, Christian church. It is the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is purely preached and the holy sacraments are administered according to the gospel" (Augsburg Confession, Article VII). That's it. The works we do in service to the world are important, but they are not the essence of the church. The ELCA does not exist in order to work for justice. Rather, because we are nourished by word and sacraments, the ELCA is free and empowered to do so.

The church is also marvelously intricate and interconnected. "We, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans 12:5). There is no such thing as a solitary Christian. God's love for us through Christ and poured into our hearts by the Spirit is for each of us. But each of us is just one member of the body of Christ. We understand the church in the same way. "This church shall seek to function as people of God through congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization, all of which shall be interdependent. Each part, while fully the church, recognizes that it is not the whole church and therefore lives in an interdependent relationship with the others" (ELCA "Constitutions, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions" 8.11.).

We are Lutheran. The average Lutheran in the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is a woman in Tanzania. There are more Lutherans in Ethiopia, Indonesia and Madagascar than there are in the ELCA. The LWF has 150 member churches in 99 countries. What binds us together? Certainly not one culture or cuisine. Rather, it is the clear witness of the gospel that sets us free. "It is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work, or satisfactions, but that we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith …" (Augsburg Confession, Article IV).

This is revolutionary. The standards of the world by which we are measured, or we measure others, are a figment. We don't claim perfection for the church. We're not there. But as Martin Luther said, "This life therefore is not righteousness but growth in righteousness, not health but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified" ("Defense and Explanation of All the Articles"). We know there is law and gospel, that we are saint and sinner, that we are bound and free, and we entrust that all to God.

We are church together. Paul wrote that we do not live to ourselves. We live in a time when fear is used to separate us. This is the tool of every authoritarian regime. The church is different. The Spirit calls, gathers and keeps the whole church on earth. We belong to God, we belong to each other, and we belong to the world.

We are church for the sake of the world. We are not only freed from sin, we are freed for service to the neighbor. Here is where the essence of the church—the proclamation of the gospel—gives power and shape to the work we do in Jesus' name. We are church for the sake of the world not out of obligation or for reward but out of love.

So there it is, dear church, my farewell address. We each have this ministry for a season. My season as presiding bishop has ended. Bishop-elect Yehiel Curry's season is about to begin. Pray for him, his family and the churchwide staff.

But be assured that the season for the ELCA is not over. God hasn't finished with this church yet.

WHAT IS BENEVOLENCE?

ELCA Benevolence, now more commonly known as Mission Support, is the portion of congregational offerings that congregations share with the ELCA synods and the ELCA churchwide organization to fund ministries beyond the local congregation, such as starting new churches, supporting global missions, alleviating poverty, and promoting justice and peace. It is the lifeblood of the ELCA, enabling shared work and mission efforts that individual congregations and synods cannot accomplish alone.

KEY ASPECTS OF ELCA MISSION SUPPORT

- **Shared Mission**: Mission Support is a fundamental way that Lutherans participate in God's mission by providing resources for ministries that are broader than a single congregation.
- **Multi-Level Funding**: Funds from Mission Support are shared between the synods and the ELCA's churchwide organization to support a wide range of ministries.
- Support for Global & Local Ministries: Mission Support resources are used for global initiatives like ELCA World Hunger, as well as for domestic programs such as supporting new mission congregations, providing leader development, and assisting congregations in crisis.
- **Historical Term**: While "benevolence" was a term used by predecessor Lutheran bodies and may still be heard, the ELCA officially uses "Mission Support" to describe these undesignated funds that fund the broader church body's work.
- Foundation of Ministry: Mission Support provides the majority of the funding that
 enables the ELCA to "live out God's call to love our neighbor and restore and
 reconcile communities throughout the world".
